PUTTING IN THE WORK

Sportscaster John Ireland '85 on Sigma Chi and the Lakers

► WHAT MADE SIGMA CHI THE RIGHT FRATERNITY?

It almost seemed like I was destined to be there. I knew I wanted to be a sportscaster, and at my UCLA summer orientation, my counselor had a friend at Sigma Chi with the same career aspirations. She gave me his name, and I called the house phone and connected with a guy named **Rick Mielke '82**, who became one of my mentors. Rick introduced me to **Randy Arrillaga '83**, who played on the UCLA basketball team, and Randy took me under his wing also. One of my friends from high school, **Allen Lynch '84**, was already a brother, so Sigma Chi was really the only place I wanted to go.

► HOW DID BEING A MEMBER OF DELTA ETA HELP SHAPE YOU?

In every way imaginable. As an aspiring sportscaster, I needed to practice out loud, a LOT. My Delta Eta friends were my first critics. They were tough, but fair, and I don't think I'd have this career without them. If I was good, they told me. But more importantly, when I was BAD, they told me. Most people at that age don't have that. When I started my career, I had people tell me it seemed like I had been doing this for years. And I had, because I basically made everybody at the Sigma Chi house watch and give me feedback.

► WHAT ARE SOME OF YOUR FAVORITE MEMORIES FROM YOUR UCLA YEARS?

I served as pro consul early in my time there, and I helped put on a fundraiser that raised more for charity than the chapter had ever

made. Later, I was the Sports Director of the campus radio station, and I served on the Interfraternity Council for a year. I'm not sure I would have ever had the confidence to do any of those things without my experience at Sigma Chi. It taught me how to succeed, how to fail, and how to work with all kinds of different people. I can't recommend it enough for somebody starting college.

► WHAT IS THE BEST PART OF ANNOUNCING FOR THE LAKERS?

I always tell people I get paid to do something I would do for free. When I was a kid, I never wanted to sleep. I would take a transistor radio (look it up, kids) and place it under my pillow so I could hear it, and my parents didn't know. I literally fell asleep to Lakers Hall of Fame announcer Chick Hearn calling games. Now I have Chick's job. I know that rarely ever happens for people—to land their dream job—so I try never to take it for granted. I've also been lucky with timing. My first year there was when the Lakers signed Shaq and drafted Kobe. Now we have LeBron and Luka. My friends always tell me I have "Irish Luck," which I actually believe.

► WHAT ARE YOU MOST PROUD OF IN YOUR SPORTSCASTING CAREER?

Probably my longevity. I started in Monroe, Louisiana; then Beaumont, Texas; then San Diego; and eventually Los Angeles. Most of the other people I went to college with got tired of living in those small towns, working for little money. I honestly enjoyed those years and worked my way up quickly. I've also always done two jobs at once. For the majority of my career, I was a TV sports guy who hosted a sports radio show. When I got the Lakers play-by-play job, I switched to doing that along with a radio show, which is what I do now. I think, by doing multiple jobs, I've been able to stay away from budget cuts and layoffs, which are a huge part of sportscasting these days.

► HOW DOES IT FEEL TO BE IN THE DELTA ETA HALL OF FAME?

A little surreal. I didn't expect it, and when they called to tell me about it, I think I said, "Are you sure you have the right guy?" In my years at Delta Eta, we all did everything as a group. It was never about one guy. So when I was inducted, I had a bunch of those guys there, and that was my favorite part: to share it with them.



They had as much fun as I did, which was the thing I'll remember the most.

► DO YOU HAVE ANY ADVICE FOR YOUNG FRATERNITY BROTHERS CONSIDERING A CAREER IN SPORTS JOURNALISM OR IN ATHLETICS?

What you need most at that age is experience. Get in front of a camera or a microphone as much as you can, even if you just turn down the sound on the TV and announce the games yourself. I still can't believe my fraternity brothers let me do that, but they did. Imagine sitting around watching a game with a bunch of people and you mute the sound to have one guy announce it. That led to me working with the campus radio station and taking broadcasting classes—I was off and running.

By the way, **it doesn't matter if you aren't any good at first; nobody is**. Keep at it—you'll get better, and when you can convince somebody to pay you to do it, then the race is on.

► HOW HAVE YOU KEPT UP WITH BROTHERS OVER THE YEARS?

One of the perks of traveling the country with the Lakers is I get to see my best friends wherever they are. I'm doing this interview in a hotel in Memphis. My next road trip takes me to Oklahoma City, and two Delta Eta brothers (including **Randy Arrillaga '83**) are coming to meet me there to watch the Lakers and Thunder. We've all been in each other's weddings, we go on vacation together, and we talk all the time. I was at a recent fundraiser and ran into a USC Sigma Chi brother I met at the Grand Chapter in New Orleans in 1983. We just picked up where we left off, like it was yesterday.

► IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE YOU WOULD LIKE TO ADD?

Just that I'm thankful to be part of Sigma Chi. I can't imagine having more fun and meeting a better group of guys than I did in my time at UCLA. We all just start laughing whenever we're together, and I would imagine it's like that for most people who have been lucky enough to go through there.

This past year has been one of tremendous growth, achievement, and momentum for our chapter. We are proud to be the largest fraternity on the row, with 130 members who embody the values of Sigma Chi and contribute to a strong, dynamic brotherhood. One of our proudest milestones was re-earning our official certification for national Sigma Chi initiation, an accomplishment that reflects the sustained dedication, excellence, and integrity of our chapter.

In fall 2024, we welcomed 40 outstanding members through a highly successful and values-driven recruitment process (led by Recruitment Chairmen **Noah Reisenauer '26**, **Alex Forbes-Roberts '26**, and **Charles Donlan '26**).

Under the guidance of Consul **Parker Kinsey '26** and Pro Consul **Drake Snyder '26**, we've made academic achievement, philanthropy, and leadership development key priorities. Our chapter currently holds a 3.6 GPA. Scholarship Chairman **Ashwin Iyer '27** has been instrumental in fostering academic support and accountability.

Philanthropy continues to be a cornerstone of our mission. Led by Philanthropy Chairman

Chase Nearn '26, we raised over \$10,000 for Palisades fire relief, while also maintaining a consistent presence in campus service and community outreach.

This year also marked the launch of our career development workshop series, an initiative aimed at equipping brothers with professional skills, networking opportunities, and guidance for life beyond college. The series has helped many brothers get involved in campus organizations such as business, consulting, and pre-law clubs, and has served as a launching pad for career paths in finance, medicine, law, sales, and creative industries, including music and media.


